Benefits of going to University

Pros

- ✓ Get to study your subject at the highest level
- ✓ Opens the door to a wide range of careers that you need a degree for
- ✓ Graduates get paid a lot more on average over their working life
- ✓ Great experience
- ✓ Get letters after your name

Cons

- £9000 tuition fees (given as a low interest loan), plus student loans- can mean debt of over £30,000 (but this is only payable when you are earning £21,000)
- 3 or 4 more years of academic studying
- First years after Uni are not always easy- good job will not necessarily be found immediately

	29 th January 2025	Equal Consideration Application deadline for University courses
	June 2025	Firm Offers and insurance deadline
	5 th July 2025	Clearing opens
	14th August 2025	Results day

The process at a glance

	Now- May-	Researching courses, pursuing interests
	May- July	 Register with UCAS and fill in personal information Book and start attending open days Try to make a decision about which general subject to do Begin writing personal statement and complete introduction and personal qualities sections
	Sept	 Give reference requests to teachers Continue going on open days Complete first draft of Personal statement Complete all sections of the UCAS online application
	October- December	 If all of the above is done, students see their tutor for their main reference See Mrs Farrington/Ms Jones to get the application sent off
	November- May	 Offers will come in Students have to decide which is their firm and reserve choice





What does the process look like?

RIGHT NOW:

- Start thinking about what you might like to study using Unifrog
- Start looking through prospectuses and online at different universities and cities where you might like to study
- Start discussing and comparing the cost (primarily living costs) of different places








What is Unifrog?

- Unifrog is our system for students to use at school or at home
- It allows them to input their predicted grades and subjects they are interested in
- It will then give them a range of courses related to their chosen subject








What is Unifrog?



What do students choose?

- Students can choose FIVE courses on their UCAS application
- ✓ At least one should be fairly <u>aspirational</u>-something achievable at a stretch
- ✓ Two or more should be <u>challenging</u> but <u>achievable</u>
- ✓ At least one should be a **safe choice** a course you will get the grades for even if you have a bad day





THE UCAS APPLICATION






Education

- You have to put the school where you did your GCSEs
- Then put NUAST (if you did GCSEs elsewhere)
- Your current qualifications go down as an end date August 2025 and the result as "Pending"










The UCAS Application


- 6 sections:
- □ Personal details
- ☐ Choices (5 university choices)
- □Student finance (appears after other sections are complete)
- □ Education- GCSEs and A level courses
- □ Employment
- ☐Statement- your personal statement
- ➤ Reference- completed by tutor along with predicted grades







The personal statement



- Read by admissions tutors to get a feel for applicants
- Allows you to tell them about your skills and experiences
- Allows you to demonstrate your suitability for the course
- 4000 characters long over 47 lines- UCAS application cuts anything over this







Personal Statement

Motivation for course: Why do you want to study these courses?

Preparedness for course: How has your learning so far helped you to be ready to succeed on these courses

Preparation through other experiences: What else have you done to help you prepare, and why are these experiences useful?









Sending the application

- Once a student has completed all parts, it goes to their tutor to write a 4000 character reference and enter predicted grades
- When this is done, the application comes back to the student to pay
- The fee is £28.50 and must be paid on card
- When this is done, it comes through to Mrs Farrington/Ms Jones for final checking and to send to UCAS (usually with the student)

THEN WHAT?





Waiting for offers

- Universities will then start making you offers
- These will be by Email or through UCAS Track
- They might invite you to interview to help them decide
- Most offers will be conditional
- Some universities might make unconditional offers






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Making your two choices



- When all offers are in, students have to choose two courses
- A firm choice- this is your first choice, the place you want to go
- A reserve choice- this is a backup, with lower grade requirements that you will go to if you don't quite get the grades for your firm choice





Deadline- First week in June 2025

- This is something to think about very carefully
- Don't pick a firm choice with grades you know you will get
- Don't pick a reserve that is as hard to get as your firm





Other options

Extra Feb-July

If all five choices have been used and they have no offers/rejected all offers

Clearing from mid-July

If there are no offers, or have applied after deadline



Adjustment

(from A level results day)

If they've gained better results than the conditional offer they hold, they could apply for a different course or university

How can you support the application process?

- Use the Parents/Guardian section of the UCAS website/Parent Guide publication – <u>www.ucas.com/parents</u> and sign up for the newsletter.
- Offer to attend open days, you may have a different perspective.
- Don't book family holidays at key times.
- Make sure they read everything carefully that is sent to them.
- Support your son/daughter's management of their application.
